UT ISCT

The International School of Cape Town is a co-educational international school offering a quality British-style education to local and foreign students.

The International School of Cape Town, established in 1998, is set in the terraced gardens of Woodland Heights in Upper Wynberg with a second campus, Struben House, a kilometer away in Eden Road, Claremont.

It is a private, co-educational Christian foundation school offering an extended curriculum leading to the internationally respected qualifications of the University of Cambridge. Our results are recognized worldwide and enable the majority of our students to enroll in their first choice of tertiary institute.

Due to the nature of the curriculum, the school is culturally diverse and is made up of South Africans who are seeking an international standard of education, as well as foreign families who find themselves in South Africa - due to work obligations and opportunities. The curriculum for Nursery to Year 9 is essentially an international version of the UK National


Curriculum in that students follow the basic outline of the UK curriculum, with adaptations to bring in local content.

Students from Year 10 onwards follow the relevant syllabi leading to Cambridge International Examinations (CIE) at IGCSE, AS and A Level.

The school is owned by Education Development Trust, a registered charity, whose involvement in education is well known and recognized in the UK.

The school is a member of ISASA – the Independent Schools Association of South Africa - and is registered with the Western Cape Education Department as an independent school.

PRIMARY SCHOOL

The curriculum in the Primary School is based upon the best theory and practice of the UK National Curriculum, but due cognisance is taken of developments in the South African curriculum.

In Key Stages 1 and 2 students follow an all-embracing curriculum which has as its key focus the development of concepts, skills, attitudes and values. Each child has an individualised learning programme which enables him/her to progress through the course from Nursery to the end of Key Stage 2 at a pace which is challenging without being stressful.

In Reception, students are introduced to literacy and numeracy concepts and skills when they are ready to learn. Reception is still a time for play and exploration, as the students gradually enjoy settling into school life and coming to terms with themselves, their families, their environment, and their peers and seeking to answer the questions of who they are and where they come from.

Key Stage Two lays the foundation for a further academic career by allowing the children to take the responsibility for their learning and behaviour. This broad base allows for the children to grow in an international context to become global citizens in the years ahead.



HIGH SCHOOL

The curriculum in the High School in Years 7 and 8 forms a natural progression from work covered in the Primary School but allows students from other Primary Schools to join us.

Years 7 to 9 (Key Stage 3) are the foundation years and seek to build up confidence, knowledge and skills in a range of subjects in preparation for Year 10, when we begin to follow the syllabi of the University of Cambridge Local Examinations Syndicate.

In Year 10 and 11 students follow the International General Certificate of Secondary Education (IGCSE) syllabi of the University of Cambridge. In May of the Year 11 year, students take examinations in eight subjects.

After the examinations, provided that the entry requirements are met, students study four academic subjects for the Advanced Subsidiary Examination (AS Level) of the University of Cambridge Local Examinations Syndicate. This qualification is recognised by Universities South Africa (USAf) and is acceptable as an entrance qualification to all South African Universities, as well as for many other universities around the world (including Australia and the USA).

Students may choose to stay on at School for a further year (Year 13) and complete the study of three subjects leading to the University of Cambridge General Certificate of Education Advanced Level (A Level) examinations. These qualifications have international credibility and recognition as entry qualifications to every university and institute of tertiary education in the world.

AS/A LEVELS

Advanced Subsidiary (AS) Level represents the first half of a full A Level course and gives students the opportunity to study a broader range of subjects without committing to doing a full A Level.


Students can complete an AS Level examination, then stop studying for that particular subject. Alternatively they can choose to complete the remaining course of study in order to take the A Level assessment.

Our AS level programme begins in July and runs for 18 months. This is then followed by the optional A level.

Many of our students complete the AS level and then enter a South African University, while those who wish to study overseas often stay on to complete the full A-level in 3 subjects. At A-level we switch from the full classroom/teaching method in AS to a tutor-supported self-study system for A2.

This involves on average two contact hours per subject per week while the student follows a well-constructed curriculum in each subject with regular compulsory assignments and assessments.

Usually, a choice of 4 subjects (for AS) is made from the list below, according to prescribed option blocks that vary slightly from year to year depending on the needs and desires of our students.





ISCT believes in balance and offers a range of extra-curricular activities in addition to the academic programme.

These vary according to season and age of student. We offer both competitive team sport and fitness activities, as well as cultural options and individual music lessons with private tutors. All activities take place from Monday to Friday.

Each class has regular curriculum-related excursions and from Year 5, all classes have an annual camp.

From Year 3 every student is assigned a House (Draco, Orion or Titan) and there is healthy Inter-House spirit in the competitions throughout the year.

We believe our staff are one of our greatest assets. Our staff have a passion for children, their learning and development. We employ well-trained and dedicated teachers who undergo regular professional development, lesson observation and work scrutiny to ensure they meet the highest standards.

There are a number of different ways parents can be involved in the school. Our Parent Teacher Association (PTA) organises regular fun- and fund-raising activities, and has a heart for giving back to our wider community through a variety of social projects.

Our parent and external Trustees oversee the Bursary Fund which awards a bursary annually to a worthy recipient entering Year 8. We also have a Parent Liaison Committee which acts as a communication conduit between the parents and the school.

In addition to these formal bodies, there are ad hoc opportunities for parents to be involved throughout the school year.
